



- 1. It would be great if you made it out to at least three inspections, in addition to our own inspection. As you know, this is a great way to meet brothers in other lodges, to share the excitement of a newly obligated brother being initiated, passed or raised and reconnect with old friends and brothers.
- 2. When you are deciding which of the inspections to attend consider this: five other lodges meet in the building in which New England does, Northwest Masonic Temple, so it will be easy for you to find. Think about the surprised look on the faces of the other lodges when, because of your attendance, we win the traveling award!
- 3. Notice that our inspection in the Fellowcraft degree on Monday, March 25th, is the last one of the year! Being the last inspection, you will have time to plan for your attendance. How

I will be passing around a signup sheet available at the January and February stated and special meetings, and the March Stated meeting as well. I am also completing a signup that will be available online. Please, sign up so we will have an idea of how many brethren we will have attending. Of course, you do not have to sign up to attend the inspections, you could just surprise everyone and show up!

Many of our neophytes may not be fully aware of the fact that our basic three Symbolic degrees are but a part of what is known to the Craft as the York Rite of Freemasonry. Comprised of four basic groupings of degrees; Symbolic Lodge, the Capitular Rite (Royal Arch Masonry), the Cryptic Rite (Council), and the Orders of Knight Templary (Commandery), it may come as a surprise that the total number of degrees within the York Rite will come to no less than 15. When listed in their correct chronological order, they'll appear like this:

- 1. Those portions of the Royal Arch reflecting actions prior to the construction of the temple (RAM).
- 2. The Entered Apprentice Degree (Lodge).



- 3. The Fellowcraft Degree (Lodge).
- 4. The Mark Master Degree (RAM).
- 5. The Royal Master Degree, First Section (Council).
- 6. The Select Master Degree (Council).
- 7. The Master Mason Degree (Lodge).
- 8. The Royal Master Degree (Second Section) Council.
- 9. The Past Master Degree (RAM).
- 10. The Most Excellent Master Degree (RAM).
- 11. The Super-Excellent Master Degree (Council) + one section Royal Arch Degree (RAM).
- 12. The final section, Royal Arch Degree (RAM).
- 13. Order of The Red Cross (Commandery).
- 14. The Order of Malta (Commandery).
- 15. The Order of The Temple (Commandery).

Confused? Want further "Light"? Well, there is a solution; the Petition process. Feel free to seek out members of these various bodies within our Lodge and they'll be glad to apply a match to your lamp of Masonic knowledge.
